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Dear friends,

At a recent commissioning service at St Philip and St Paul with Wesley for Rachel Bray it was so heartening to see so many friends and churches represented in the congregation, including the leaders from the mosque and the synagogue. All enjoyed each other's company, the service full of joy and laughter, and the reminder that we worship the same God and we are united in faith and fellowship.

For me, 2024 feels like it's already run its course, I think partly after the awful events of the summer - and we continue to hold all those affected in our hearts, in our prayers. This is a time when we can only "be" alongside each other, as words aren't enough, and so we have to offer the burden to the One who can carry the load. As the hymn says, "Father, I place into your hands the things I cannot do. Father, I place into your hands the times that I've been through. Father, I place into your hands the way that I should go, for I know I always can trust you."

That image of the little baby in the manger, born into a world of oppression, poverty and difficulty, yet surrounded and sustained by a loving family and friends, serves to encourage us all to share our lives with each other, and to embrace the future in a spirit of hope and renewal, hour by hour and day by day.

Is the word Xmas really a modern invention?


Those who lament the modern commercialisation of Christmas find the abbreviation Xmas particularly irritating, even offensive.

Yet the writing of Christ's name as X or Xp – the first two letters, *cho rho* of *Christos,* his name in Greek – has a long history. The Anglo-Saxon chronicler reported (in Old English) the death of a bishop early on *Xpes maesse* in 1021.

In modern English, abbreviations of Christmas to X'tmasse are attested from the mid-16th century, and by the 18th century Xmas was in colloquial use. John Buxton hoped that a friend would eat roast beef at Xmas in 1721.

In 1827 one of Lady Shelley's correspondents noted that it was "as cold as Xmas, even the butter was frozen". Josiah Wedgewood coined a verb, "xmassing" to denote a seasonal play. Xmas is here to stay; we can't blame it on modern ignorance.

Notes from the Archives – Part 13 : 2010

Interim Minister's Report: Peter Lyth reported that although the URC and Cornerstone congregations had joined together as a united church, the legal documents were proceeding rather slowly. The Cornerstone building had been sold and the agreement was now with the North West Baptist Association for 80% of the funds to be released for enhancement of the URC church premises.

In 2009 a financial deficit of nearly £4000 was recorded, so Peter led a TRIO (The Responsibility is Ours) presentation, which led to a substantial increase in giving, which together with various fund raising activities, resulted in a surplus of £1538 in 2010! The funds were certainly helped by the Summer Fair, which raised a remarkable £2470.

URC and Cornerstone Church Secretaries' Report (Jenny and Chris Williams):

In January a formal Uniting Service took place "so that all now feel as if we are one congregation", a new notice board was erected telling everyone we were now Ainsdale Village Church.

Improvements to the building included new carpet tiles in the Small Hall. At the 2010 AGM, Alison Hayhust stepped down as Fabric Steward to be replaced by Peter Aspinall and Brian Williams, who organised replastering and painting in the vestry, followed by a new carpet.

The trellis work was installed in the Community Garden and planting continued. It was stated that the garden was one of our outreach projects, together will regular giving to the Christian Blind Mission, supporting Christian Aid with coffee mornings, and 23 shoe boxes.

In October the church meeting unanimously voted for Peter Lyth to continue for another year as our Interim Minister. We welcomed Lucinda Green, Peter Aspinall, Chris Williams and Jeremy Lister to the Eldership. The Team Ministry for Southport and Formby was taking shape, which developed into the format we know today.

Churches Together in Ainsdale: Throughout the year Lucinda was putting in a lot of hard work organising a Village Green Nativity, involving meetings, discussions and rehearsals with lots of volunteers from different churches. Then it had to be cancelled due to the greatest snowfall since 1962!

Youth Work Report: Joan reported that they were in the unique position of having a youth group of all the same age. A few of them had been coming for several years when they had come along with other siblings. They brought friends and their friends brought friends. This meant that, as they went off to college etc at the same time, none of them would be returning in September. As some of the leaders were also leaving, it was decided not to continue in September. However, the AYP (Ainsdale Young People) provided great entertainment and dinner at Christmas. The Vestry Café continued on Saturday mornings and several young people were able to use this as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Award. It was hoped to relaunch the Youth Group after Easter.

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In these notes from the archive, I thought it would be interesting to go back to 1877 when the Ainsdale Congregational Church (this Church) was founded.

When Jenny and Wendy checked the safe, they found the Church Record Book from that time.

It contains lots of information on the founding and development of the church, so I will start with the next Messenger. Later we can come back to the present era.
